

Course Description. Neuroscience is a hot topic; breakthroughs in studying the brain have excited many professionals who try to understand how people process information and make decisions. Lawyers have been particularly eager to use neuroscience to inform choices from jury selection to custody disputes. Here a leading neuroscientist and an experienced commercial mediator take a trans-disciplinary perspective; looking iteratively at the science and the mediation process. In particular we will examine how stress, hormones and emotion impact behavior in people engaged in conflict and what conclusions mediators can draw from these areas of inquiry. We will look at the physiologic stress response, emotions, trust and cooperation, and decision-making. In the afternoon we will engage the audience in a series of exercises designed to put the theoretical concepts into practice.
