THE OHIO SPECIALIZED DOCKETS PRACTITIONER NETWORK

With over 100 specialized dockets in operation throughout Ohio, the Supreme Court of Ohio, the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services and the Ohio Department of Mental Health have recognized the need for interaction among the professionals that staff these courts. In order to provide such a forum, the Ohio Specialized Docket Practitioner Network was created to provide peer support and technical assistance to these programs. The Network is comprised of several sub-networks that meet by discipline. These sub-network meetings allow specialized docket practitioners to discuss the challenges and successes they have faced in their specific role on the specialized docket court team. In addition, the sub-network meetings offer opportunities for specialized docket professionals to provide program updates, discuss program operations, and discover innovative and effective strategies employed by other specialized dockets. MENTAL-HEALTH CUTS CARRY HEFTY PRICE, ADVOCATES WARN

With another budget hole looming, advocates for behavioral health care laid it on the line yesterday to state officials: pay now or pay a lot more later. An unusual cast of characters – a county commissioner, hospital emergency room director, judge, police chief and school superintendent – agreed that cutting mental-health and addiction funding will ring up a much bigger bill later in terms of arrests, incarceration, hospitalization and deaths. EX-JUDGE WANTS TO PRACTICE LAW AGAIN

Former Mason Municipal Court Judge George Parker has been cleared by his doctor to practice law again. Parker, who was suspended from practicing law in October 2007, filed a request with the Ohio Supreme Court, Tuesday, April 28, to have his law license reinstated. More...

SUPPORT GROWS FOR ENDING SENTENCING DISPARITY BETWEEN CRACK, POWDER COCAINE

President Barack Obama wants to stop punishing crack cocaine offenders more harshly than those caught with powder cocaine. It's a notion that has had growing support among judges and lawmakers, but is only now being championed by the White House. <u>More...</u>

SUPREME COURT HEARS DEATH PENALTY CASE

The Supreme Court appeared likely Monday to give the state of Ohio another chance to sentence a convicted killer to death, despite a previous factual finding that the man is mentally retarded. The justices heard arguments in the case of Michael Bies, who was convicted in 1992 of killing a 10-year-old boy in Cincinnati and sentenced to death after a jury found his mental state did not outweigh the heinous nature of the murder. Trumbull County Prosecutor Dennis Watkins was keeping close tabs Monday on arguments before the U.S. Supreme Court concerning a Cincinnati murder case that parallels that of death row inmate Danny Lee Hill. <u>More...</u>

MENTAL HEALTH COURTS INCREASE DESPITE DEBATE

Ohio Supreme Court Justice Evelyn Stratton took a leading role in expanding that state's mental health courts — there are 40 either operational or being planned — and has worked to do the same nationwide. Stratton said the courts really are just a docket management tool, and that judges have inherent authority to control their own dockets. She said putting it in law could do more harm than good. "All this is so new that to legislate it now when we're still experimenting and growing and trying to invent the wheel would just not be productive," she said. More...

OHIO: CONDEMNED KILLER MUST PROVE DISABILITY AGAIN

The state is fighting to reinstate the death sentence of a convicted killer, arguing he must prove again that he is mentally disabled under U.S. Supreme Court standards. Ohio says the mental state of Michael Bies has never received a proper hearing because state court findings came six years before the Supreme Court in 2002 barred the execution of the mentally disabled. COURT HELPS OVI OFFENDERS MAKE POSITIVE CHANGES

The Hamilton woman, who agreed to speak without using her full name, is more confident, and her life is back on track after her second charge of Operating a Vehicle while Impaired in December. However, Fairfield Municipal Court Judge Joyce Campbell is helping Rhonya, and a few other multiple OVI offenders, reclaim their lives. More...

'FRONTLINE' FOLLOWS MENTALLY ILL INMATES AS THEY GAIN FREEDOM

Keith Williams was just about to get out of prison after a two-year sentence for burglary. Suffering from paranoid schizophrenia, he had no family with which to reunite but said he would return to Toledo to be "with my people." More...

JUSTICE STRATTON SPEAKS AT CHILD ABUSE SEMINAR

Evelyn Stratton, Ohio Supreme Court Justice, helped kick-off the event by providing the audience members some details about policies, grants and taxable refunds available for services and families. In addition to talking about Bridges out of Poverty and helpful links on the Supreme Court Web site, Stratton discussed the Ohio Benefit Bank (OBB) which aids low and moderate-income citizens in Ohio with access to tax credits and public benefits and other assistance in life. LOCAL COURTS CONNECTING TO OHIO COURTS NETWORK

Sixteen local courts connected to a statewide justice information exchange system now have the capability to cast a wider net in searching backgrounds of those appearing in court. Developed by the Supreme Court of Ohio, the Ohio Courts Network (OCN) serves as a centralized warehouse of case-related data, enabling courts and justice system partners to share information and to support functions such as criminal history reviews, warrant and protection order searches, pre-sentencing investigations, background checks, handgun pre-purchase reviews and pre-custody reviews. For the first time since crack cocaine sparked a war on drugs 20 years ago, the number of black Americans in state prisons for drug offenses has fallen sharply, while the number of white prisoners convicted for drug crimes has increased, according to a report released yesterday. More...
