GIVING KIDS ALCOHOL ILLEGAL, NO MATTER WHAT

Hosts Ronald and Cathy Swiggett apparently took away car keys to keep partygoers safe on New Year's Eve, but that won't help their cases in court.

That's because many of the 100 guests at the couple's home that night were younger than 21 and clearly intoxicated when deputy sheriffs broke up the party along Dale Ford Road just outside Delaware, Delaware County Sheriff Walter L. Davis III said. "To provide alcohol to minors is illegal," he said. "Just because you're doing it in the privacy of your home doesn't make it legal." More...

TASK FORCE TO ADDRESS EX-OFFENDERS RE-ENTERING SOCIETY

Local officials estimate that more than 300 inmates will be released from prison to come home to Clark County over the next ten months. A newly formed county coalition will tackle some the issues facing those ex-offenders, with the hope of reducing the number who return to crime after they are released. More...

CENTER LETS CHILD-SUPPORT DEBTORS KEEP JOBS

Judge Scott D. VanDerKarr doesn't like sending some people to jail. Since Franklin County's lone work-release program ended in 2005, VanDerKarr has mourned its loss. He's always thought that some people he sentences, such as those who owe child support, would benefit more from keeping their jobs than spending a short stint in jail. More...

MAN FACES 17TH DRUNK-DRIVING CHARGE

Mason man faces his 17th drunk-driving charge - ranking him among Ohio's worst repeat drunken-driving offenders, state records show. The charge comes just four months after Kevin J. Ante, 45, left prison after serving nearly four years for his 16th conviction. On Sunday, West Chester police say they caught Ante behind the wheel despite a lifetime driving suspension. More...

FRANKLIN COUNTY RANKS NO. 1 IN DUI ARRESTS

The State Highway Patrol made 3,080 drunken-driving arrests in Franklin County this year through Nov. 30, according to figures released yesterday by the patrol. Franklin County led the state in arrests. Butler County, north of Cincinnati, was a distant second with 1,992 arrests. In all, troopers had made 22,925 DUI arrests on Ohio's roads through Nov. 30.Lucas County (Toledo) had 1,817 arrests; Stark County (Canton), 1,597; Lorain County (Elyria), 1,591; and Montgomery County (Dayton), 1,442. OCJS ANNOUNCES AVAILABILITY OF SECOND ROUND STIMULUS FUNDING

The Office of Criminal Justice Services has just released a request for proposals (RFP) for re-entry projects. Eligible applicants include: existing re-entry coalitions, counties wishing to start a coalition and Ohio-based learning institutions interested in evaluating chosen projects.

ADDRESSING SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT GAPS

Deadline: January 14, 2010

The Substance Abuse, Mental Health Services Administration is accepting applications for Substance abuse treatment to address gaps in drug treatment capacity by supporting person-centered and self-directed approaches for substance abuse treatment and recovery services in communities with serious drug problems. Eligible entities are domestic public/private nonprofits. Approximately \$14.4 million in funding will be available. It is anticipated that up to 12 grants of up to \$400,000 per year will be available for each of the three years, \$4.8 million per year.

SAMHSA WILL PROVIDE \$39.6 MILLION TO SUPPORT JUVENILE AND ADULT REENTRY AND RECOVERY SERVICES

Deadline: January 19, 2010

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) is currently accepting applications for the Offender Reentry Program. The purpose of the program is to expand or enhance substance abuse treatment and related recovery and reentry services to sentenced juvenile and adult offenders returning to the community from incarceration for criminal/juvenile offenses. Programs should help those who have been incarcerated make a stable transition back to the community, provide treatment for drug and alcohol abusers, and reduce future offending. Grants will be awarded through SAMHSA's Center for Substance Abuse Treatment, for fiscal year 2010. The deadline for submitting applications is January 19. Deadline: February 11, 2010

The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) is accepting applications for Implementation, Single Jurisdiction Enhancement and Statewide Grants under the Adult Drug Court Discretionary Grant Program. PURPOSE: To establish or enhance Drug Courts and systems for nonviolent substance-abusing offenders. For the purposes of this solicitation, the definition of "Adult Drug Court" may include Driving While Intoxicated (DWI)/Driving Under the Influence (DUI) Courts, Co-Occurring Drug and Mental Health Courts, Veterans' Treatment Courts, and Community Courts. WHO CAN APPLY: For Implementation and Single Jurisdiction Enhancement Grants, applicants are limited to states, state and local courts, counties, units of local government, and federally-recognized Indian tribal governments; Indian tribal governments may apply directly or through other public or not-for-profit private entities. The purpose of this program is to expand and enhance substance abuse treatment services in courts using the Juvenile Drug Court model in order to provide alcohol and drug treatment, recovery support services and program coordination to juvenile defendants/defenders. It is expected that up to 27 grants will be awarded for up to three years. The average annual award amount for each grantee is expected to be up to \$325,000. WHO CAN APPLY: SAMHSA/CSAT is restricting eligibility to existing individual Juvenile Drug Courts or their Tribal/State or local governmental proxies who may apply on their behalf. OJJDP SEEKS INFORMATION ON DSO PROMISING PRACTICES

The Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) seeks information on initiatives that help states achieve or maintain the deinstitutionalization of status offenders (DSO). To that end, OJJDP invites state agencies and others to <u>nominate</u> programs and strategies that have shown promise in keeping status offenders out of jail or removing status offenders from juvenile or adult detention, regardless of funding source.

Nominated programs will be reviewed for inclusion in a database of promising DSO initiatives. To be eligible for nomination, programs and strategies must have been in operation for at least 2 years and data documenting their impact must show improvement over one or more periods of time.

ONLINE COURSES TRAIN JUVENILE JUSTICE MANAGERS

The <u>National Juvenile Court Services Association</u> has designed an online training curriculum to train juvenile justice managers. Students will spend two weeks on each course, working on basic lecture material, specialized readings, and self-assessment questions.

OHIO YOUTH ASSESSMENT SYSTEM TRAININGS

The Department of Youth Services is pleased to announce the completion of the Ohio Youth Assessment System. Over the past three years, DYS has partnered with University of Cincinnati (UC) to develop a risk, needs and responsivity assessment specific to Ohio's youth. With the help of the pilot counties and facilities UC was able to collect and analyze data in order to develop a system of assessments that expand as a youth moves deeper into the system. The OYAS is made up of five instruments (Diversion, Detention, Disposition, Residential and Reentry) which will assist juvenile justice professionals in making the best decisions for youth and creating a common language across systems.
