OHIO LEGAL RIGHTS SERVICE URGES STATE TO BAN RESTRAINT METHOD AFTER TEEN'S DEATH

A state advocacy group has called on the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services to ban the type of restraint that has been linked to the death of 17-year-old Faith Finley last month. Cuyahoga County Coroner Frank Miller said Faith suffocated while being restrained at Parmadale Family Services in Parma. Her death was ruled a homicide. Miller said she had been held in the face-down restraint. **More...**

OHIO'S LACK OF WISDOM, POOR COMMUNICATION COST TEEN HER LIFE – EDITORIAL

The death last month of 17-year-old Faith Finley – who suffocated while being restrained at a center for troubled youth – leaves a trail of clues that lead straight to clueless state policies. No matter whether criminal charges are filed in the case, Faith's death has exposed a lethal level of inefficiency in the state's supervision of agencies charged with the protection and safety of some of Ohio's most vulnerable kids. The number of restraint-related injuries in the state is ambiguous, because no agency collects that data, Plain Dealer reporter Rachel Dissell found. And even though details about serious injuries and deaths are supposed to be reported to whichever agency licenses a facility, that information is not shared with other licensing agencies. More...

PSYCHOTIC DEFENDANT, THOUGH COMPETENT TO STAND TRIAL, CAN'T BE HIS OWN LAWYER

Mentally ill criminal defendants who are found to be competent to stand trial don't automatically have the right to act as their own counsel, a New Jersey appeals court held Wednesday. The ruling, made possible by a U.S. Supreme Court decision last year that gives state courts discretion to decide

such issues, upheld a trial judge who assigned a lawyer to represent an accused thief who proclaimed he was the acolyte of an ancient civilization's princess. **More...**

RELEASED CUYAHOGA COUNTY JAIL INMATES WOULD INCLUDE DRUG-ABUSE, THEFT SUSPECTS, ANALYSIS FINDS

Hundreds of suspected thieves and drug users could be back on the street if Cuyahoga County Sheriff Gerald McFaul follows through with his threat to cut costs by releasing low-level offenders from jail to save money. McFaul, who must pare \$4 million from his \$81 million budget, said he may be forced to stop sending nonviolent criminals to jails in neighboring cities and counties and relieve crowding in the Cuyahoga County Jail. JUDGES' PAY EXAMINED

When Bruce Winters was elected Ottawa County Common Pleas Court judge, he knew he would be taking a pay cut. Winters, currently the common pleas court part-time magistrate who presides over domestic relations cases, will leave behind his private practice and part-time magistrate salary. . . . Judge Fritz Hany of Ottawa County Municipal Court said he doesn't think about whether his salary is large enough. After 18 years on the bench, he said he enjoys the job and the extra things it allows him to do, like adding an intervention court last year for defendants who suffer from mental illness or drug and alcohol dependence and the ability to teach other judges continuing education classes. "It's an honor," Hany said. More...

JUDGES: WOMAN WHO DROWNED TWO DAUGHTERS INSANE

An Ohio woman who drowned her two young daughters was declared not guilty by reason of insanity Friday after a short trial before three judges. The judges spent four hours considering their verdict before delivering their decision on Amber Hill, 23, of Cleveland, The (Cleveland) Plain Dealer reported. They found that prosecutors offered no real rebuttal of evidence from two experts – one hired by the defense and one court-appointed – that Hill was psychotic. "Justice is not always punishment," Common Pleas Judge John Sutula said. "These killings shocked the conscience of every person including this panel. But the law demands that in order to be convicted of a crime, the defendant know its wrongfulness." More...

The National Institute of Justice (NIJ) is the research, development, and evaluation agency of the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) and a component of the Office of Justice Programs (OJP). NIJ provides objective, independent, evidence-based knowledge and tools to enhance the administration of justice and public safety. NIJ solicits applications to inform its search for the knowledge and tools to guide policy and practice. NIJ is seeking proposals for research to evaluate the effectiveness of a demonstration program that includes a drug-testing, sanctions, and treatment protocol for chronic drug users under criminal justice supervision in the community. The basic principles of the program must include: (1) frequent drug testing; (2) certain, swift, and proportionate sanctions for failed tests; and (3) access to residential treatment, as appropriate. The purpose of this research is to inform and improve criminal justice and public health policy and practice and to reduce recidivism among chronic drug offenders on pretrial status, probation, or parole.

STALKING VICTIMIZATION IN THE UNITED STATES

A major national study on stalking, released on January 13, 2009, by the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS), serves as a wake-up call about a serious and often misunderstood crime, says the National Center for Victims of Crime, the nation's leading resource and advocacy organization for crime victims and founder of the Stalking Resource Center. *Stalking Victimization in the United States*, the largest collection of data on stalking prevalence and behavior to date, found that 3.4 million persons identified themselves as victims of stalking in a 12-month period.
