COMPANY STREAMLINES DRUG TESTING FOR COURTS

By streamlining substance-screening and reducing duplication, Warren County officials were able to reinvest the \$155,000 in saved expenses and invest in mental health care. Eliminating duplication is among the reasons that Franklin County Municipal Court has begun using a private company to handle some of the drug testing for its specialty courts. More...

PRISON REFORM AWAITS KASICH

Every weekday at the Correctional Reception Center at Orient, Ohio taxpayers welcome new "guests." Some days, 20 prisoners arrive at the reception center south of Columbus; other times, as many as 150. Officials never know what to expect because counties don't have to provide advance notice. In the 2010 fiscal year, 24,023 prisoners entered the system - 4,825 from Cuyahoga County alone. Nearly half of them will be released in a year or less. <u>More...</u>

JUDGE LAUDED FOR DEDICATION TOWARD YOUTH

Summit County Juvenile Judge Linda Tucci Teodosio was in Columbus on Thursday to receive a statewide honor as the founder of a program helping young offenders cope with mental illness and substance abuse. It is called the Crossroads Program, and it provides intensive case supervision by court probation officers in the youth's home, school and community. If the offender successfully completes the yearlong supervisory program, in which family member participation also plays a significant role, charges against the youth are dismissed. <u>More...</u>
