Camry is watchful and attentive. He's patient and effective. "And that takes an awful lot of discipline because he's just 2. Everything he wants to do right now is jump up and run around," Clark said. More...

NBC'S DATELINE AND TODAY SHOW GIVE MILLIONS OF VIEWERS AN IN-DEPTH LOOK AT DRUG COURT

Sunday night, millions tuned in to NBC's Dateline for an hour long look inside Michigan's Mercer County Drug Courts. The documentary style piece, which also aired on the Today Show, chronicled the year-long experience of three individuals whose addictions landed them in front of Adult and Juvenile Drug Court Judge Mary Chrzanowski. Throughout the riveting story, viewers got to see the judge known as 'Scary Mary' in action as she introduced participants to the rigors of Drug Court, worked with them through the difficult first months, fought to keep them on track when they

stumbled, and rewarded their successes. While the story is a profile of just one of over 2,800 Drug Courts in the United States, it underscores two important issues critical to the public's understanding of all Drug Courts. First, the individuals profiled in the piece, no matter their original charge, were given the option of Drug Court because they were assessed and shown to meet the clinical criteria for drug-dependence. Once they were admitted, the Drug Court team worked tirelessly to keep them in the program and deal with relapse and other issues that arose along the way. FUNDING OPPORTUNITY TO SUPPORT SCHOOL JUSTICE COLLABORATION PROGRAM

Applications are due by July 21, 2014.

OJJDP has announced the fiscal year 2014 School Justice Collaboration Program: Keeping Kids in School and Out of Court funding opportunity. OJJDP is coordinating with the Department of Education and Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration to implement a multidisciplinary initiative to improve school climates, support student mental health and behavioral needs, avoid referring students to law enforcement as a disciplinary response, and facilitate a proactive and supportive school reentry process in the rare instances in which a youth is referred. OJJDP's announcement has two components: One provides support to juvenile and family courts to partner with schools and law enforcement. The second will provide for technical assistance to the courts and other stakeholders working to reform discipline policy and practice.
