THE NEW SPECIALIZED DOCKETS STANDARDS

SUPREME COURT ADOPTS SPECIALIZED DOCKETS STANDARDS

The Supreme Court of Ohio has adopted a new rule that allows local courts to receive Supreme Court certification of a specialized docket. The rule takes effect on Jan. 1, 2013. The rule allows a court operating or establishing a particular session of court to apply for certification of the session from the Supreme Court. The session must offer a therapeutically oriented judicial approach to providing court supervision and appropriate treatment to individuals placed in it. Upon receipt of Supreme Court certification, the session may be referred to as a “specialized docket.” Since the establishment of the Hamilton County Drug Court in 1995, Ohio has been recognized as a national leader in the implementation of specialized dockets. In 2001, the Supreme Court created the Specialized Dockets Section to assist and support local courts in developing specialized programs uniquely tailored to helping specific populations within the court system. Today, there are nearly 150 specialized dockets operating in Ohio including drug courts, mental health courts, re-entry courts, OVI courts, veterans courts, sex offender courts, felony non-support courts and domestic violence courts. The 12 standards included in the newly adopted Rule 36.02 of the Rules of Superintendence for the Courts of Ohio are intended to create a minimum level of uniform practices while still allowing courts to tailor operations to meet their local needs. The standards spell out the procedure for certification. They require courts to engage in a planning process for their specialized docket programs, use a non-adversarial approach, hold regular treatment team meetings, and conduct regular status review hearings for individuals placed in the programs. The standards specifically exempt commercial dockets, housing dockets and environmental dockets from the requirements of the rule. [View the complete language of the rule.](#)

REPORT: MOVE MENTALLY ILL YOUTH FROM OHIO LOCKUPS

The state should transfer mentally ill juvenile inmates to psychiatric facilities as soon as possible and find money for their treatment, according to a new report on the status of Ohio’s youth prison system. The Department of Youth Services holds some of the most acutely mentally ill youth in the state, who would be transferred to more appropriate psychiatric treatment facilities if they were hospitalized or in other settings outside detention, the report said. MILITARY PERSONNEL, VETERANS, SUICIDE, AND INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE

Basic Principles of Strategic Planning: This training session will cover information on strategic planning as it relates to infrastructure development and planning that is specifically tailored for community and local agencies. The training will expose participants to concepts and ideas that will help develop a plan for growing their agency or program and how it is related to applying for, administering and evaluating a program that could be funded through OCJS, etc. **This training will be held January 24, 2012.**

Logic Model: This training session will discuss and present information on logic-model development as it relates to program planning and development that is specifically tailored for community and local agencies. The training will expose participants to several different logic model designs and how they relate to securing funding through federal, state and local sources. The training will also: define implementation; explore strategies for real-world application of innovative, research-based practice; highlight why the effective implementation of evidence-based practices is critical to achieving outcomes; and outline six core components that drive successful program implementation. **This training will be held June 5, 2012.**

That's right, the [NADCP 18th Annual Training Conference](#) is just a few months away. This year, the world's largest conference on substance abuse, mental health and the criminal justice system will be in Nashville, Tennessee, with the theme: Drug Courts: Where Accountability Meets Compassion.

NEW REPORT: LEGALITY OF DENYING ACCESS TO MEDICATION ASSISTED TREATMENT (MAT) IN THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM

A new report published by the [Legal Action Center](#) details the circumstances in which the denial of MAT violates Federal anti-discrimination laws and the United States Constitution. The report concludes: Denial of access to MAT at any level of the criminal justice system violates the Americans with Disabilities Act and the Rehabilitation Act where the denial is pursuant to a blanket policy prohibiting MAT or is carried out on a case-by-case basis without the required objective, individualized evaluation. The denial of MAT pursuant to a policy prohibiting the use of any prescribed controlled substance also is likely to violate the ADA and Rehabilitation Act. NADCP continues to lead the Drug Court field in understanding of the law and its duty to treat every participant according to their individual needs. In July, NADCP issued a Board Resolution on MAT, stating that Drug Courts must not impose blanket prohibitions against the use of MAT for their participants. The statement resolves that the decision whether or not to allow the use of MAT must be based on an individualized assessment of the clinical and medical needs of each participant and the interests of the public and the administration of justice. NADCP continues to train Drug Courts to this standard and urges all Drug Court professionals implement proper procedures related to MAT.

The Ohio Domestic Violence Network is pleased to announce the launch of its on-line primary prevention of intimate partner and sexual violence empowerment evaluation toolkit. This innovative toolkit is the result of six years of working with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) DELTA Program. Following Getting to Outcomes methodology for planning, implementation, and evaluation of primary prevention activities, ODVN's Empowerment Evaluation consultants Amy Bush Stevens and Dr. Sandra Ortega developed the toolkit as a user friendly translation. Ohio's local DELTA Projects, several sexual violence prevention programs funded by the Ohio Department of Health, and state leaders, provided critical feedback throughout the development of the toolkit. The entire toolkit is available on-line as one unified document (165 pages). In addition, each item listed in the Table of Contents is available to download as a separate pdf file and worksheets and templates are available in both pdf and word document form.

"We want to advance the field of intimate partner and sexual violence primary prevention," stated Amy Bush Stevens. "This innovation will aid local communities across Ohio and the country by making program evaluation readily available to those who design and implement them.
